

Who are the inmates?




Many have lived experience of:

- Trauma; high ACEs
- Addictions
- Mental health diagnosis
- FASD, learning, intellectual & developmental differences
- Family violence, sexual violence, emotional abuse, physical abuse
- Formal education gaps
- Have had or living with STI, HIV, Hep C

- How to talk to kids
- Decision making
- Accessing services
- STBBI/harm reduction



Goals

"I sure wish you'd've found a way to teach me all this sh*t before. That way, maybe I'd've stayed out of this place"

What Else is Being Done?



- HIVCL
- Safeworks/Streetworks, Hep C nurse, STI and PNNs
- Corrections AHS nurses/clinicians
- Correctional programming (life skills, some harm reduction)
- Other AHS programming such as sex offender treatment, addictions treatment
- At young offender programs, a wider variety of community services provide(d) additional education in and out of school programming



"There always seems to be quite a few people who connect with us to come here, but we need to know they are willing to work with us, can follow security protocol and that they know what they are doing."

What Do We Do?



Provide **COMPREHENSIVE GROUP** sexuality education that follows best practice related to:

- PHAC Canadian Guidelines for Sexual Health Education
- Teaching to diverse abilities
- Teaching high risk or vulnerable populations
- Cultural awareness, sensitivity, competence

- Pedagogy AND Andragogy
- Harm reduction
- LGBTQ+ inclusive practice
- Reproductive rights
- Trauma informed approach
- Plain language



Why we provide education that is:

Comprehensive:

- Builds trust & rapport
- Reflects reality humans are holistic & complex
- Normalizes healthy sexuality, and talking about it
- Meets identified needs
- Reduces negative health outcomes
- Increases positive health outcomes

In Groups:

- Normalizes healthy sexuality and talking about it
- Cost effective, broader reach
- Creates learning network relationships support learning
- Can use variety of activities and teaching strategies
- Mutual support Learners recognize not alone in thoughts and feelings

Relationships

Well trained, authentic, professional, comfortable, non-judgmental & objective educators

Safer and inclusive spaces

Expertise in pedagogy and andragogy

CSE, clear objectives & accurate messaging

Willingness to respect and follow security protocol

Humor and storytelling

Teacher modelling of skills & boundaries



"One of the best parts about doing this, other than just getting out of the unit, which is a very good part, is having you and other guys in here just acting like this is all normal. I sure didn't get this growing up and it's messed up that it is in jail I'm getting it though."

Logistics

- Security clearance/training
- Clothing & materials restrictions
- Keys, getting in, searches
- C.Os make the time calls
- Personal safety and the BIG RED BUTTON
- Group dynamics, who gets to attend
- Lockdown, canteen, count
- Early release, court date


How Is It Going?

Results - Knowledge


Pre and Post Test Knowledge Scores
